Dear Christ Church,

When we read in the book of the prophet Jeremiah about the invasion of Jerusalem by the Babylonians, the terrible famine that followed, and the forced captivity and abduction of all but the poorest of the Jewish people to Babylon, it's hard not to be moved. Then we find that it is a long 50 or so years later that the first exiles were allowed to return to their homeland under Zerubbabel and Joshua the high priest. Together they began to rebuild Jerusalem that the Babylonians had destroyed all those years previously, and it was hard, dangerous work. The prophet Nehemiah records that opposition to them was so fierce, that they had to build the wall of Jerusalem with one hand, and keep a weapon in the other.

And while we haven't had 50 years of enforced exile due to an enemy nation, in a way, we have had one year of exile due to an enemy illness. And whilst it has caused a lot of pain and suffering, there have been some rays of God's goodness shining through, some of which we can read in the "River of Life" booklet. So, in all of it, I think it is good to be grateful for the way God has cared for us during this time, and the way He is now bringing us out of it.

Psalm 100: 4 tells us to "Enter his gates with thanksgiving and his courts with praise; give thanks to him and praise his name." so it is good to develop an attitude of gratitude for all He has done for us.

With this in mind I would like this week to give thanks for our amazing Orpington High Street. As I've had to pop into town to get some things, I've been amazed at how Orpington has responded to coming out of lockdown. Walking along yesterday, many of the cafe's and restaurants had worked hard to get tables and chairs out onto the pavement, giving an air of friendship and vitality, and almost a holiday feeling as you walked through them. Virtually every shop was open having worked hard to make sure correct guidelines were followed, and there was a general air of "LIFE" everywhere. I hope the outside cafe's and restaurants continue even after they don't need to as it gives such a great feeling to the town.

SO A BIG THANK YOU TO ALL THE RESTAURANT/CAFE OWNERS AND STAFF, AND ALL THE SHOP OWNERS AND STAFF, FOR SERVING US SO WELL

I would also like to take the opportunity to thank all the church staff and leadership who have worked all the way through, under continually changing rules, and keeping the church not just running but available online as well as open whenever possible for people to come to. Touched surfaces are wiped down with anti-Covid wipes; used rooms are "fogged" with anti-Covid disinfectant to sterilize everything; hand sanitizer, masks and social distancing is enforced; and Holy Communion is carried out in a completely safe way so that all may come to the Lord's Table and receive without worry. I don't think there can be any safer place to come to!

As we go through the next few months, let's pray that God will open our eyes to all the things He has done and is doing for us, so that with the Psalmist we can enter His gates with thanksgiving and give Him the praise due to His Name.


Café Mosaic

Nectar in your garden

Our home gardens are now the largest source of food for insects such as bees and wasps in towns and cities.

They yield 85% of the nectar produced in urban areas, according to a study published in the Journal of Ecology.

Three such gardens will generate about a teaspoon a day of the sugar-rich liquid which is found in the flowers that the pollinators drink for energy. A teaspoon of nectar is the equivalent of more than a ton of food for an adult human, and it is enough to fuel thousands of flying bees.

One ecologist has called home gardens "pivotal" in promoting biodiversity in urban areas across the county. Gardens are thought to cover 29 per cent of the land in urban areas, which is six times the area of parks and 40 times that of allotments.

The research was carried out in partnership with the universities of Edinburgh and Reading and the Royal Horticultural Society.

For instance, one woman was terribly worried about the chaotic state of her frail and elderly mother's financial affairs. Because one of JV's guests was a representative of CAP (Christians against Poverty) this lady was put in touch with them and they are now sorting things out for her and relieving her of the distress she was experiencing. Although we have mostly never met one another, go to all different sorts of churches of various denominations, vary widely in age, circumstances, and personality type, there is that wonderful sense of 'family' because of our relationship in our Lord Jesus.

Someone posted the following prayer. He said it was an ancient prayer of the Church of England, but I had never come across it before.

Watch, O Lord, with those who wake, or watch, or weep tonight, and give your angels charge over those who sleep.

Tend your sick ones, O Lord Christ. Rest your weary ones. Bless your dying ones. Soothe your suffering ones. Pity your afflicted ones. Shield your joyous ones. And all for your love's sake. Amen.

Wordsearch - Rogation Sunday

SUNDAY 9th **MAY** is **ROGATION** Sunday. This is when many parishes still '**BEAT** the **BOUNDS**'. Rogation means an **ASKING** of God - for **BLESSING** on the **SEED** and **LAND**. The practice began with the **ROMANS**, who **PROCESSED** around the **CORNFIELDS** each **SPRING**, singing and dancing, sacrificing animals, in order to get rid of evil. About 465 AD the Western world was suffering from **EARTHQUAKE** and **STORM**.

Mamertius, Bishop of Vienne, aware of the pagan custom, ordered that **PRAYER**s should be said in the ruined or neglected fields. Thus 'beating the bounds' became a Christian ceremonial. It arrived in England early in the eighth century. Each Spring, led by the priest, a little party from the parish would set out with a **CROSS** to trace the **BOUNDARIES** of the parish. They'd implore God to keep their **CROPS** and roots and boughs in good health, and bring them to **HARVEST**. In the days when **MAPS** were scarce, 'beating the bounds' helped remind everyone just where the boundaries were.


