

Family News 18th September 2021

Helen writes

Next Saturday afternoon I will be ordained deacon in Rochester Cathedral and then I will be officially welcomed at Christ Church during the morning service on Sunday as I become your part-time self-supporting (i.e. Unpaid!) Curate (Vicar in Training).

I have been a Lay Reader since 2003 firstly in the Chichester Diocese and then at Cudham and Downe. Since my early twenties I've run various church youth groups with my husband John, led at least two toddler groups, and been a children's worker in two different parishes. I've been a leader on Beach Missions at Abersoch and on Pathfinder camps for children from a socially disadvantaged area of the Wirral.

A number of years ago I ran an Alpha Group, was part of a ministry team and also involved in prayers for healing. While at university I read the book 'Nine o'clock in the Morning' by Dennis Bennet about the beginning of the charismatic movement in the Church of England and later became involved in charismatic worship influenced by John Wimber and St Andrew's Chorleywood. I have also attended a couple of summer sessions of the Emmanuel Community, a community for Catholic charismatic renewal, in Paray Le Monial, Burgundy.

The church where I grew up was evangelical, a CPAS parish like Christ Church. As a child I was sent to Sunday School, later I went to Pathfinders and then CYFA. I decided to become a Christian at the age of 14 and at university in Manchester I joined the Christian Union. I am immensely grateful to my Pathfinder and CYFA leaders, the Bible teachers at the Christian Union and other places since, from whom I learned to love the Scriptures and to hear God speaking to me through them. Later I was introduced to other ways of hearing God speak including silence, imaginative contemplation of Scripture and creation.

Coming from a background in Biochemistry I have worked in a hospital Haematology laboratory, been an infant teacher and a professional gardener, a job I still do, particularly here in the Vicarage garden, continuing to make it into a quiet garden that other Christians can enjoy. My theological training began in Lichfield Diocese with the Bishops Certificate, closely followed by another(!) Bishop's certificate in Chester Diocese and then Reader training in Chichester Diocese. Recently I have studied theology part time for three years at St Augustine's College in West Malling. I have been married to John, a Vicar, since 1983. Originally from Staffordshire I have lived in London and the South East for nearly 25 years. We have two children and four grandchildren living at opposite ends of the country – one in Southampton and the other in Durham.

So why now? Why get ordained now? Looking back God first began to call me to ministry in my late teens and early twenties and has gone on nudging me ever since but I have not always listened and have gone off and done my own thing. On Christmas Day 2017 I finally realised that this calling that I'd tried to keep hidden wasn't going to go away.

I am a Diocesan Accredited Spiritual Director. On the first day of training for this ministry I nearly left as I thought why am I here? This isn't all that I feel called to do. I heard God saying to me, 'Finally I've got you to listen, I want you to be ordained.' This time I did listen and contacted Pamela Ive, Diocesan Director for Ordinands and Vocation – and so here I am!

I thank God for all who have prayed and supported me over the years, especially my husband John and my children, the congregations at Cudham and Downe who have given me feedback throughout my recent theological training, my ministry supervisor Christine and my Spiritual Director. I want to thank God too for June, a dear lady in a previous parish who prayed for me through some difficult times.

And now I thank God for you too, Christ Church, especially for making me so welcome and allowing me to join you in the next part of our adventure with God. I look forward to ministering among you.

The academic new year 2021/22 has begun! This year we are starting the new academic year with a few uncertainties "hanging around" us. Many people are still scared of the pandemic and confusing rules, set by the government, tend to change every so often. In addition to this, there is a big percentage of the Latvian population that resists

vaccination, including Christians, and this affected us in our educational activities. Currently, only those who are vaccinated or have a negative test or had Covid in the past can sit in the class. The students without these prerequisites need to watch it online (livestream). Therefore, the new intake of students for this academic year was unusually slow. Nevertheless, we've got 22 new students. On the 3rd of September, we opened a new academic year with prayer and celebration.



School of Preaching



It was quite an event in the life of the School of Preaching! After 1 year of online teaching via Zoom, we managed to meet face to face in the classroom @ LBC! Oh, how refreshing that was!! We were covering the topic of "Whole life Preaching", which is designed to help preachers to see how they can better learn about the context that they are preaching and to preach prophetically into this environment. Our teachers were A. Billington from the UK and John Woods, LBC's co-ordinator for the School of Preaching.

Church-based counselling



LBC in co-operation with the church 'Salvation Temple' and a Counselling ministry in Germany, has started a counselling course to equip men and women for pastoral care in the churches. We had a wonderful day of teaching with around 50 people being represented and from around 3-4 churches – Russian and Latvianspeaking! That was great to see that kind of cooperation.

Word Search

On 3rd September, the Church remembers St GREGORY the Great (540-604AD), one of the most important popes and influential writers of the Middle Ages. He is well worth remembering, because he also changed the course of HISTORY in the British Isles. The SON of a very rich ROMAN SENATOR, Gregory CONVERTED as a YOUNG man, and sold his vast ESTATES to found six MONASTERIES in Sicily and a seventh in Rome. He gave **GENEROUS**ly to the POOR, and became a MONK. Christians in England owe him a great deal. When Gregory came across some ENGLISH **SLAVES** for sale in Rome, he asked who they were, and was told, 'They are ANGLES.' Moved with compassion for these despised men, he replied, 'They are not Angles, but ANGELS!" He planned to go to England to evangelise the Angles, but **PLAGUE** broke out in Italy about 590, and during this time he was **ELECTED POPE**. But Gregory did not forget the Angles. In 596 He sent Augustine to England, and so indirectly became the **APOSTLE** of the English
