Lent 5 What Does Easter Mean?

What does Easter mean? Let me suggest three things that we all need to know and need to remember.

First, Easter is about God's involvement with us. Some people believe in a God who is like some orbiting satellite, floating high above the earth and viewing us all with curiosity but no concern. The God of the Bible is not like that. At Christmas we see how God's love for the human race compelled him to become one of us in Jesus, but at Easter we see how deep that love made him go. Here Jesus descends to the worst depths of human experience; he is betrayed, abandoned by friends, given a sham trial, tortured and then brutally executed. He is not like some celebrity who, in the face of a tragedy, turns up for two minutes, poses for a brief video clip and is then helicoptered away. Jesus is described as 'Emmanuel: God with us' (Matthew 1:23) and Easter reminds us that he didn't opt out from being 'with us' when things got tough. In these days it's thought-provoking that in his crucifixion Jesus would have experienced painful isolation - 'My God, my God, why have you forsaken me?' (Matthew 27:46) – that he died in agony and was buried in haste. It is a reminder that we have a God who, in Jesus, became totally involved in our world, from accepting a birth in poverty to enduring a death in cruelty. If you are not yet a believer in Jesus, then this is the God who invites you to know him. If you are a believer, then be comforted: in whatever situation you find yourself, Jesus remains close to you. He is involved in all we are and all we suffer.

Second, Easter is about God's intervention for us. The good news of Christianity is that God did more than just come alongside us in the darkness of life; he did something about it. Easter is all about how God intervened in the brokenness of our lives in this world in order to redeem and restore it. At the heart of that intervention for humanity is Jesus' death. On the cross, he grappled with all that is evil and absorbed it into himself. It is as if, in dying, Jesus created a spiritual black hole that drew in and neutralised all those 'viruses' that wreck lives: sin, guilt, evil and even death itself. The Easter story comes in two parts and we cannot linger on Good Friday. Part One ends with a hurried burial that appears to be, most definitely, the

end. But there is Part Two: on the Sunday we see Jesus risen from the dead – not just alive but as *life* itself. It is the proof that Jesus didn't just grapple with evil but triumphed over it. In his death, death died. If you are not yet a believer in Jesus, then this is the heart of the matter: an intervening God who takes the sin, guilt and pain that you cannot bear and bears it himself at the cross. And if you are a believer, then be comforted: in whatever situation you find yourself, Jesus is victorious over the worst this world can throw at you.

Finally, the real Easter is about God's invitation to us. Wonderfully, God became involved in the human race and intervened for all of us. Yet the important and unmissable part of the Easter story is that it is not merely about humanity in general; it is about you in particular. Jesus offers each one of us an invitation. It is an offer to let him intervene on our behalf, to take our sin and guilt. It is an offer to know the power, love, joy, peace and hope of the resurrection that we all need at this time. It is an invitation that demands a response from you and me. This Easter, why not accept it? And if you have already accepted it, can I just encourage you to trust in it. Let the Easter message that Jesus has died and risen from the dead be with you in all you do. Can I encourage you to receive Jesus Christ or reaffirm your faith by praying this prayer:

Dear Jesus, thank you for dying on the cross for me.
I believe you are alive today and you are Lord
and God.

Please forgive all my sins and guilt and cleanse me from all the wrong I have ever done.

Set me free from the past. I invite you into my life by your Holy Spirit. Fill me with your power, presence and peace.

Help me from this day on to follow you.

I pray this prayer in Jesus' name. Amen.

The flower arranging team would like donations of foliage on **Saturday 16th April**. Please bring foliage to church from 9.30am.



Thank you so much for hosting us for prayer and with accommodation:



We begin in Kent on May 14th, pray and ride to Penzance by May 31st. We resume after the Queen's Jubilee celebrations and after the TURO conference on June 6th, head east and end back in Kent on June 24th

An enormous thank you to your church for hosting us on the evening of May 17th when we ride through and have times of friendship and prayer with you on our bike pilgrimage. We ride and pray to raise attention levels for persecuted Christians through prayer and financial support. We're very grateful, too to those who are hosting our cyclists and car-drivers with overnight hospitality

We do this through the ministries of RELEASE INTERNATIONAL and CHRISTIAN SOLIDARITY WORLDWIDE (CSW). We really want people here to strengthen those Christians who put up with so much persecution and restriction in many countries of the world.

Those of us cycling are young and old, though most of us are retired. I guess that in being eighty this year,

I am the oldest. My family didn't think I'd make the whole of this pilgrimage, so secretly bought me an "ebike". At least I shall now keep up! I think that our youngest is Samuel, who is in his early thirties. He works on an eco-project of recycling waste in Nepal last year because of very strict COVID "lockdowns", he was holed up there for six months! Amongst us are various professions - a marine engineer, a couple of computer boffs, a managing director of a food company, a retired dentist, a former theatre sister, some retired clergy, plus a variety of others. Four of us are riding from North Foreland Point (Kent's most easterly point and always a focal point in the daily weather shipping forecasts) to Land's End, and then by a different route back to Kent. We zig-zag around for about 900 miles and take about five weeks to do it! Forty-four churches are hosting us, which is fabulous. We don't pressurise our pedals too heavily and take time to lift our gaze above the tarmac. Another forty cyclists will join us for shorter lengths of the route.

Just before COVID, Jeremy Hunt, the then foreign secretary commissioned the Bishop of Truro, Philip Mountstephen, to launch a commission of enquiry into the terrible oppression to which Christians and other religious minorities are subjected. This had input from CSW and Release, as well as from OPEN DOORS and other agencies, and indicated government seriousness in raising issues of persecution in so many countries countries, which like Pakistan, have been generously supported by UK overseas aid.

The top ten countries in which it is most difficult to be a Christian are Afghanistan, North Korea, Somalia, Libya, Yemen, Eritrea, Nigeria, Pakistan, Iran and India. There are many others. Sadly, new legislation in China, introduced on March 1st, has enforced further restrictions on Christians there. Nevertheless, in all these countries, even those where Christian numbers are very low, there is an inspirational vibrancy of faith. Again and again, Christians in these countries thank us not only for financial support but for our prayers. The websites of CSW and RELEASE INTERNATIONAL constantly update us with news of critical danger for Christians.

When we come your way, we are longing for people to come to pray with us. The times of prayer will include speakers from CSW or RELEASE and DVID input for information. When Paul was in prison in Rome, his appeal to the Colossians was not that God would get him out of there, but his instructions were, "Devote yourselves to prayer, being watchful and thankful. And pray that God will open a door for us to proclaim the mystery of Christ, for which I am in chains". It will be lovely to meet and pray with members of your church.

CRUCIFIXION

What's happened on this day was told by prophets and by seers. Their words have truly come to pass after all these years.

Perhaps there was more to this man, Jesus was his name. Since he arrived I have to say things haven't been the same.

I'm going home, it's getting dark. I must be on my way. I wish I'd met this Jesus man before this awful day....
