



Bishop Jonathan's Easter Message

One of the most encouraging things about the Bible is that it is full of stories of failure. Stories of people who have made a real mess of things, but whom God has turned around and given a fresh start. People like Jacob and Joseph, like David and Peter and Paul, and many more besides.

I find that encouraging because it offers hope for me and for our world. We mess things up and get ourselves in a right pickle, but God can still intervene and create something wonderful, far beyond anything we could have imagined.

And that is the heart of the meaning of the Cross and Resurrection, of the events of Holy Week and Easter. Jesus enters Jerusalem triumphantly on Palm Sunday, but by Good Friday morning he has been arrested and the crowds that had welcomed him are now baying for his blood. He is crucified, deserted even by his friends, and finally laid to rest in a tomb hewn from the rock.

Dead. Buried. End of the story. Except of course that it wasn't.

Three days later, Jesus was raised from the dead and the news of his victory over death began to turn the despair of his friends into joy and delight. And so was born the community of disciples who went on to share the story of what God had done right across the ancient world, until the Roman empire itself bowed its knee to the very one it had crucified.

As things stand in this country, it can feel as though faith is on the retreat, that the message of the crucified and risen Jesus is somehow irrelevant to the world of today, with its complex challenges, and its slick, hi-tech answers to its problems.

But when we stop to think, we begin to realise that we human beings have not got things quite as sussed as we thought, with climate change and war and the refugee crisis and so many more issues besides. Perhaps after all we are not as clever and as capable as we like to think.

T S Eliot once said that humankind cannot bear very much reality. We try to hide from the mess we have made of our lives and of our world, filling our time and attention with things that amuse and distract us.

But that can only work for so long – and I think we are perhaps approaching a tipping point beyond which we will no longer be able to hide from the truth of what we have done to ourselves and the world in which we live.

Just now when it may seem that the Christian faith is in danger of being forgotten in our society, perhaps this is the time when the message of Jesus' death and resurrection, of failure and new beginnings, has the chance to be heard once more.

Quite plainly, we human beings do not have the capacity to sort things out for ourselves. We need someone to come alongside us and save us from ourselves, someone who can offer us a new beginning and a better way.

Our world needs a saviour – and we as Christians need to let them know just who that is.

Alleluia, Christ is risen! He is risen indeed, Alleluia!

Dear friends, we are again approaching one of the joyous dates in our annual calendar – the celebration of Easter. The resurrection of our Savior is the foundation of our life, faith and hope here and now and in the life to come! What a glorious perspective!!!

LBC life

Since our last letter many things have happened at LBC during this winter.

- Our students continue to receive training and teaching in different fields.

Mission studies. In partnership with the Church of Salvation in Jelgava we had a weekend of training Sunday school teachers. This was a wonderful opportunity for Sunday school teachers to become aware of Missional thinking and approach in their Sunday school activities. The Mission and missional thinking start right from the early age!





**LBC certificate.** Our students had an opportunity to learn about Church history and Church dogmatics. There is a possibility to learn from history in order not to repeat them in the 21st century! We need also to be rooted in faith and Dogmatics course enables students to get deeper in their understanding of Christian faith. As Victor's principal Dr Peter Cotterell in London Bible College once said: "We teach students to understand deeply, so that they in turn, would be able to explain simply".





**School of Preaching.** School of Preaching continues its task of training in the art of preaching. The newly acquired knowledge is combined with the examples of practicing sermons from the students of SOP who went through training previously. It's great to see how knowledge go hand in hand with practical application.






## Counselling training & Bereavement training seminar

Our Counselling training program and the work of the Crisis center powers ahead. This work is twodimensional. One group of students is being trained in cooperation with Peace & Reconciliation Network @ European Evangelical Alliance and currently we have around 24 students on this level. The other dimension of this training and work happens in and through LBC Crisis center which is led by Anastasija Gaidabrus, herself a refugee from Ukraine, a trained Christian psychologist and counsellor. The work which is led by Anastasija has many levels and dimensions - working with Ukrainian refugees in Latvia, practically training our former students from Level 1 and helping different churches to develop Church-based counselling. As the next step in the development of this important ministry we are currently in negotiations with a Counselling Institute to give our students a Degree in Counselling. Additionally, we had a joy of welcoming a Counsellor Knut Andersen from Norway, who led a seminar on bereavement.







Christianity, Work & Society. This group of students just finished their program and already going and applying the knowledge, which they received at LBC in their workplaces. This program is designed in such a way as to help our students to realise their missional calling in their workplace.

Among those, who studied at this program were social worker, shop assistant, business owners and chaplain. Please pray for them to be a witness for the Lord wherever they are.





LBC recording studio. We had the joy of receiving a New Year surprise when we were told by one supporting organization that they will fund a recording studio for LBC. We received the funding already and started working on making all the necessary repair works/adjustments in one of the rooms of Salvation Temple where our studio will be located. Ephraim Shmits, our SOP coordinator is leading this strategic development. This will enable LBC to produce a good quality video and to record the lectures as well as promotional material. This studio will enhance the work and effectiveness of LBC even further! We are really excited about this opportunity.
