In addition to taking the minutes of each meeting a limited amount of general correspondence was dealt with.

Annual Accounts 2010 Summary version

The electoral roll is updated annually and in 2010 comprised 204 members, an increase of 10 since 2009. The breakdown was:

Male = 81, Female = 123; Resident in parish = 90, Resident outside parish = 114.

The average weekly attendance during October (when the annual count is done for the Diocese) was 155 adults aged 16 or over and 46 young people aged under 16.

<u>Income</u>

Total receipts for the General Fund were £215,842. The proportion of donations that are gift aided was similar to that in 2009 - 85% of General Fund donations when taken together with the tax recoverable, compared with 86% in 2009. The income from the hire of the hall increased significantly in 2010 to £21,728 (10% of total receipts) and income from the café rose to £18,275 due to more catering at special functions (8% of total receipts) – this represents a 16% surplus of café income over café expenditure.

The planned giving by envelopes and standing orders to the General Fund increased by 32% to £95,118 (£118,502 with the tax recoverable). We are very grateful to those who give in this way as it enables the church to set a realistic budget. In addition the amount promised in Advent was £4,725 a year in increased or new standing orders. People also gave £3947.81 to the General Fund in a special offertory at this time.



The net result for the year was an excess of receipts over payments of £31,060; of this £14,500 was transferred to the Mission Support Fund and £18,000 to the Church Repair Fund. The balance of the General Fund carried forward at 31^{st} December was £131,296; down £2,400 on the previous year.

Missionary Giving.

To celebrate the 70^{th} anniversary of Christ Church a Gift Day in June was focused upon supporting mission that has gone out from this church, or which might go out in the future. £30643.96 was raised -30% was sent to the Light House Project in Southampton (to support Tim Hyde a former member of Christ Church), 30% was sent to Viktor Petrenko (another former member of the church) to help provide accommodation in Riga, Latvia and 10% was sent to Pat Blanchard working in Lima, Peru to help buy and adapt a building into a treatment centre for handicapped children. The remaining 30% was used to create a small fund to enable any within Christ Church to test their calling to the ministry. Other donations to missionary charities and agencies in 2010 totalled £37,315 (£27,751 in 2009).

In addition, £1,337.92 was raised by a door-to-door collection by Christ Church members in support of Christian Aid.

Where possible and desirable we specified particular projects to be beneficiaries of these agencies' sums. For example Tearfund's Sagoal project in Nepal, LCM's Day Centre for the Homeless at Waterloo, two SAMS projects in Lima shanty towns. We sent the full amounts to the General Funds of the other agencies - CPAS, Barnabas, and Spinnaker.

<u>Sent to mission partners</u>, usually former members of our fellowship, were then each awarded 2/3 of the agency figure, except for the Petrenkos, who, with an extra £500, need additional funds for a house-build. Two extra items were also added*.

DEANERY SYNOD REPORT 2010-2011

The Deanery Synod met 3 times in the year 2010 - 2011, (Vicar and Messrs Fox and Owen were your representatives).

26th May 2010 at CCO with a presentation "Using the Arts in Relational Mission".

Dance, Flowers, Stained Glass, Banners, Murals, Photography, Audio Visual, Mosaic and Collages, Drama, Lighting, Candles, - all being used to communicate. Churches in the deanery need to transcend boundaries of tradition and spirituality to create a living history. Why should Christians engage in creative art? Bezalel filled by God for craftsmanship – creative art. The church has space to change perceptions for the wider community, and show that creativity is appreciated. Vision/creative art is needed, not a large church with a huge budget – it can build bridges between church & community.

14th October 2010 at Christ Church.

Jay was commissioned Area Dean for Orpington by the Ven. Dr Paul Wright.

Parish Pictures were given by two new incumbents:

Paul Prentice, the just licenced vicar at St Andrew's church, described a strong sense of community in a mixed area, a liberal, catholic tradition and a with smallish congregation. God had led him to St Andrews where there was potential for growth in priesthood, and ministry to the people over the coming years.

Father Robert Lane, the new vicar at St Francis Petts Wood, a quiet and peaceful church but also full of vibrant faithful people. Having only been at St Francis for 2 weeks Father Robert felt that this is the place he is meant to be.

Jay then set out a Deanery Vision. Our churches and our geography are very diverse; very wealthy to very poor. It is good that we all live near one another; good for learning from one another, examining and reflecting on best practice.

27th January 2011 St Mary's St Paul's Cray

Parish Picture: Vicar Rev Chris Kitchener and Wendy Macxallister, Head of St Paul's C of E Primary School. The parish is very diverse, including significant numbers of Travelers, some of whom are fully settled, others more mobile. The school is small but with good space and a very positive outreach.

The meeting was primarily devoted to the subject "Church and School in Community". The main item was a presentation about Academy Status for Bishop Justice School by the Head and one of the Governors. They were very positive that Status was expected to be granted, and very clear on the advantages.

Presentations were also made about schools work, emphasising the importance of links to Community. Caroline Bailey described the involvement of CCO.

Hall Bookings/Centre Management

The post of Hall Bookings Administrator became a paid position in May 2010 when I was appointed to take on this responsibility. Many thanks to Len Gardiner for all his hard work and commitment in undertaking this role in a voluntary capacity until then. This change was instigated by a marked increase in hall bookings, by both internal and external hirers, with a corresponding expansion in administration. This trend has continued over the last year with the setting up of several youth pod groups, a Youth Alpha course, Inspire dance and prayer workshops, and the monthly evening prayer times. Two new dance classes have begun, one using traditional dance forms and another using street dance.

Our dedicated regular hirers have continued to find Christ Church a convenient and suitable venue, and I've begun to foster good relations with the leaders of these groups which include Orpington Photographic Society, Charterhouse Pre-School, Stroke Link Club, Kentish Opera, Slimming World, 4Israel and Rochester Diocese. The Maypole Project has made several bookings to use our facilities - including the Rainbow Room, which has frequently been booked by families of children with special needs. Requests from potential regular hirers are still being considered, although the capacity of the halls to offer regular times for new groups needs to be considered alongside the needs of the community already here at Christ Church.

The installation of audio visual equipment in the halls has been partially completed as I write, but has already provided us with access to high standard equipment that is user friendly. Len has continued in his role as Facilities Manager and reports that the reliability of plant and the cost of maintenance continues to be a matter of concern, though there has been some improvement and cost reduction over the last year. Intensive premise use does though come with a corresponding increase in wear and tear.

During the last year there has been a consultation with the congregation to ensure that the focus of the support we give reflects the passion of the congregation to support societies and individuals.

During 2010 there have been 8 visits or deputations from mission partners. £14,510 was distributed on behalf of the church to Mission Support Fund partners and special collections also raised further sums of money for specific mission partners.

During 2010 we supported the trip of Chris Hemming to Uganda and an ambitious trip of 15 young people and leaders is being supported in 2011.

The end of 2010 saw Graham Bartlett stand down from Chair of the Mission committee after 18+ years on the committee with 10 years as Chair. His passion, dedication and hard work in this role will be missed.

<u>Weekly Prayer Meeting</u> - Some of us meet for prayer between 9 am and 9.45 am on Saturday mornings, usually about 10 or 12. We would warmly welcome others who are able to join us.

Rainbow Room/ children with additional needs.

On a Sunday morning the Rainbow room is used by the crèche and the under threes. Mary Dalton runs a group of volunteers who supervise these sessions and keep the children safe. Numbers of children using the room each Sunday range from 5-9 and are supervised by 3 adults. The children have a lot of fun leaping around but also have a short time to listen to a bible story.

The room is also available to be used by the community so that children with additional needs can have a fun place to meet. We have a small group of regulars who meet for fun together. These sessions are supervised by a member of our SEN committee. Last year I mentioned that we had been approached by The Maypole Project who had a fabulous Christmas party in our halls. They are now regular users of the facility and hold fun days during each school holiday. We now have an arrangement with their organiser that they will provide their own supervision for children using the Rainbow Room during these days. We have also been approached by another organisation who provide respite care for families with Autistic children and we are hoping that they will be able to start using the facility very soon.

Small Groups and Discipleship

Worship Group - Morning

We try to reflect the full range of traditions and preferences of the congregation in our choice of music, but this is sometimes influenced by the musicians available each week. As a team we are grateful to Jenny Warrington for being available to play the organ for each group, although we have experimented with the organ sound on the keyboard (all constructive comments welcome!). Simon Lindley took up an organ post in Bromley and so can only join us on the first Sunday in the month, but we welcome his musical talents when he's able to come along.

Both groups have welcomed new members over the course of the year – Dave Bailey, Simon Clooney, Jes Branscombe and Philippa Allen have joined Liesel's group and Bob Haythorne has

joined Mel's group. We are very sad to report that Roy King, who has served in the morning group for many years, has withdrawn from the group because of illness. We're grateful for his dedication and faithfulness in being part of the music group, and we wish him every blessing. God's timing is perfect and, just as Roy was unable to join us, Bob offered his services as a pianist, organist and guitarist. Each group is now almost up to full strength.

Worship Group - Evening

It provides a good opportunity for young people to plan and lead worship through the efforts of the IGEN planning team. The evening service is also a good environment to enable preachers to experience preaching to a smaller congregation. However, the numbers in both IGEN and Evening Worship are lower than we would hope (even when the experience in worship is very positive.) We seek God's guidance as to how we might attract members of our wider community to this service.

Church Wardens' Report

The main event of 2010 affecting the fabric of the church was the programme of repairs to implement the 2009 Quinquennial Report. During the summer, a huge structure of scaffolding was installed around much of the church building, from which our chosen builder, Ross Brothers, was able to replace slipped or broken tiles on the roof and to carry out extensive repointing of the church walls. This should put an end to the water penetration which had begun to damage plaster in the chancel and balcony. The repairs also included a complete refurbishment of the church vestibule toilet.

We should like to take this opportunity to thank Betty Hatherly, who supervised the quinquennial repairs and who chaired the Fabric Committee for eleven years until her retirement in December 2010. We shall miss her commitment and expertise.

The Fabric Committee has again met at regular intervals throughout the year to review the annual maintenance schedule and to discuss minor and not-so-minor repairs. The cost of maintaining the fabric would be higher but for the many repairs which Committee members carry out themselves, for which we are very grateful. The support of other church members on work mornings is also greatly appreciated.

Completed projects include the installation of a blind over the church's round window and putting the maintenance of the church grounds out to contract. On-going projects include the installation of a new audio-visual system in the halls. There are also, as usual, a variety of further issues under discussion. In particular, we are currently seeking further advice on the upgrading of the building's lightning protection, and we are beginning a review of the state of the church's lighting, particularly in the chancel.

Finally we wish to thank our long-suffering wives, Janet and Marion, for their invaluable support during the year.

Youth Ministry 2010/11

This year the leadership of youth ministry at Christ Church has gone through the most change and transition of the last twelve years.

This has been an exciting time and it has been a joy to welcome Chris Hemming into a more formal role as Assistant Youth Minister, seeing him flourish within this and relishing the extra responsibility he has been given. It has also been a joy to welcome Charlotte Zeal as she joins the team as part of her placement alongside Oasis College as she studies for her Youth work and Ministry degree. We have also welcomed Marie Wicket as she supports the youth ministry through her role as administrator. It is a privilege to oversee such a gifted, able and enthusiastic team. This team has been supported by an equally gifted and enthusiastic team of volunteers, Susan Ward, Jenny Seares, Brenda Bennett, Jenny Warrington, Jonny Askham, Hannah Goddard, Len Gardener, Sarah Askham, Sara Georgiardis, Graham Bartlet, Sarah Warrington and Matt Fargie. A huge thank you to you all and all you have given and done for the youth ministry at Christ Church this last year.

The change in leadership came about because of the change in my ministry situation; I am now working 20 hours a week for Christ Church as Senior Youth Minister and 20 hours a week as Lecturer in Ministry Development at Oasis College, teaching and contributing to the degree and masters

programmes within the college.

Last year we asked three very basic questions, as a simple strategy within youth ministry. What are we doing for the young people who attend regularly? What are we doing for their friends? And what are we doing for those young people in our community in which the church is based?

Let us look at these first two questions; what are we doing for the young people who attend regularly and what are we doing for their friends? We answer these through the following. We run 'Base' (ages 11-14: Saturday, 7.00pm - 8.30pm) and 'Base Plus' (ages 14+: Saturday, 8.30pm-10.30pm), which Chris oversees. In addition to these Saturday groups we run two Sunday groups: the Pathfinder group (11-14), which Charlotte oversees (Sunday mornings) and the Juice group (14-18), which I oversee (Sunday night). In addition to these, we also ran a Juice weekend away at the end of January, a great time of fellowship and learning more about the fruit, gifts and ministry of the Holy Spirit.

As well as this, we have five pod (small) groups that provide a way of going deeper for young people in their faith. The Pod groups continue to provide an environment where young people are supported and discipled by a significant adult who demonstrates God's fidelity by 'being there' for them. Chris Hemming, Charlotte Zeal, Sara Askham, Sara Georgiardis and myself run these.

I also oversee I:gen, and this provides an opportunity for young and old to worship together; young people and the not so young (!) creatively plan, lead, speak at and facilitate these moving and sometimes profound acts of gathered worship. It is a real blessing to see God at work in young people's lives as they gain experience in leading worship, preaching and developing creative acts of response to the work of God's spirit in our lives.

We are currently reviewing this time together as although all of the above apply, we are continuing to pray and wait on God and to seek to follow the move of his Spirit, to see if this is the right 'vehicle' through which to engage young and old together through patterns of worship and teaching.

Alongside these regular groups, Chris Hemming, Charlotte Zeal and Susan Ward have been running Youth Alpha on a Saturday morning for young people to explore and ask questions about their developing faith.

An extra initiative that has grown out of Chris Hemming's gap year has been the decision to run a trip to Uganda through Mission Direct. This exciting and faith filled initiative, that Chris is heading up, will provide an opportunity of overseas Mission for ten young people and five leaders as they serve the people in Uganda. Moreover, Soul Survivor, Pathfinder and CYFA ventures and helping at Holiday Club also continues the work of God's Spirit in the lives of many young people, as He brings them line with His word bv the power of his

At the beginning of May we ran a 'Passion' event based on Slum Survivor; here we built a giant slum for 90 y/p - in the grounds of the Oak Church in St Mary Cray. We lived for 24 hrs in poverty, living on a third world diet of lentils and water. Through this initiative we raised over three thousand pounds for Tear Fund; in addition to this, we explored God's word as we looked at his heart for justice, righteousness and the poor. Matt Fargie, Chris Warrington, Terry Seares and Lewi Colwill made an excellent DVD of this venture.

As we approach the question 'What are we doing for the young people in the community?' we find this is answered by Drop in (Thursday Afternoons 3.30pm-6.00pm). Chris Hemming, Charlotte Zeal, Jenny Sears and Brenda Bennett lead and help with this – it is now well into its second year and proves a popular and positive place for young people to come after school.

Through these many and varied groups and activities we seek to provide answers to our three questions: What are we doing for the young people who attend regularly? What are we doing for their friends? And what are we doing for those young people in our community in which the church is based? In seeking answers to these questions we are in regular contact with approximately 70 - 80 young people.

In addition to this, we have also been successful with a grant application from the Church of England's Youth Evangelism Fund. We have two thousand pounds towards a park based event that is planned to take place on June 30th 2012.

Alongside my role at Christ Church and Oasis, my doctoral research studies (DthMin) through Kings College continue to both challenge and invigorate me as it exposes me to engaging thinkers and theologians that inform my practice as a youth minister. Within this I am currently due to present academic papers on my current research, one in May amongst my colleagues and visitors at Oasis College and then in September, at Durham University, at an 'Ethnography and Ecclesiology' conference, which is both exciting and at the same time rather daunting!

Finally, none of the above would be possible without God's grace. Please pray that as we surrender this work to the sovereignty of God, His Spirit will continue to empower and move in the lives of the young people we have relationships with. Please pray with me, that the Father will be glorified and that young people will deepen their relationship with Him and be transformed to be like Christ through the power of the Spirit.

Children's Ministry Report

It is without doubt that the Children's Ministry at Christ Church is flourishing!

Sundays: The Sunday morning programme has delivered increasingly innovative and inspired teaching by committed and gifted individuals, providing children with both relevant learning and engaging ways of exploring their faith. "This is the best time I've ever had at church!" nine year old Max declared to his mum while bursting out of the Explorers door the other Sunday. Climbers and Explorers numbers have steadily grown and new families have sought to take an active part in the life of the church.

Mary Dalton and the Sunday crèche team continue to provide excellent care and support on Sundays. Often the first point of contact for baptism families or visitors, their faithfulness in providing a warm welcome should not be underestimated.

"Outburst!" monthly praise, has seen creative input from both our young musicians, Spring's dance apprentices, Doug Horley ministries and a number of adults from the church who are gifted in inspiring worship in children. Sharon Russo has been leading these sessions sensitively and spiritually, enabling an atmosphere where both leaders and children can worship together.

People often remark on the value of our 'Altogether Time' in church, where the children's learning theme is introduced at the beginning of the service before the children and leaders go out to their groups. Those few minutes spent together as one whole church family, help us feel connected and grow together.

Midweek: Mel Ketchin and Caroline Bailey report separately on the weekday activities of Rainbow Room 'safe place to play' bookings and Mini Movers. Café church and links with the Highway school through parents such as Sue London and Sarah Gardiner all contribute to the friendly welcome experienced by many families in our local community.

Paula Lynch and I have become rather competitive in maintaining the quiet attention of approximately 25 or more babies and toddlers (and their parents/carers) while we deliver a short Bible story during Tea and Toys. It has become a fine art and an achievement! Jay brings his guitar for a time of singing and the fun and relationship-building found in this group is rewarding. Judith Motto and Maureen Grandini form part of this lovely team. Our thanks go to Steph Fargie who has been a great team member for some time but is no longer able to join us on Wednesdays. Doreen Turvey after many years has now semi-retired (she thankfully still comes to make the tea!) and we are so grateful to Doreen for her years of faithful and prayerful commitment to mums in the community - some of whom now return with grandchildren!

Last June 2010, Joanne Gavin took a step of faith in relinquishing her regular job to follow her heart and work with children. Her courage has paid off enormously in the voluntary role of ministry to schools with Spinnaker Trust. She writes: "One assembly was about 'sitting on the fence', I took a fence with me and we had the children debating over various choices, they loved it. Martin [Solomon] was fantastic he really had the children engaged with him, trying to decide. Caroline [Bailey] is helping to teach songs that fit the theme written by Doug Horley and we hope this will encourage them to come to his event held at Christ Church later in the year."

Special Events: Events have been a huge part of my networking role as Children's Minister. Organising shared opportunities for children to fellowship, have fun and deepen their relationship with God alongside those from other churches both in Orpington (Big Breakfast events in July 2010).

and January 2011), as well as Diocesan events (GLOW - March 2011 in Rochester Cathedral where many of our own folk were stewards). Doug Horley's "Go Wild!" Family Praise Party in September 2010 attracted 250 people from around Orpington and an exciting 35 children responded to the gospel message! This was also a timely event to invite our holiday club families to, including those who didn't manage to secure a place at holiday club 2010 due to its popularity and limit of 150 places!

Personally: The use of the vicar's vestry downstairs and the appointment of Marie Wickett in September as part time Children's & Youth Administrator have been welcome and timely. My own family has been very patient while work commitment this year has frequently taken more time and energy than I have had. Each of them has helped in some way. I am grateful to; my parents for their very creative contributions (story sacks, props/costume items and even a 'to scale' Galillean boat); to Laurence (17), Michael (15) and Daniel (6) who have stepped in either technically, creatively or physically - wherever there was a need; but most particularly to Mark - for his very practical and ongoing support and encouragement.

Looking Ahead: As we see a steady growth in our Sunday morning ministry, my third year here as Children's Minister will see a special focus on growing leaders within these groups. Also, an emphasis on nurturing each individual child through small pastoral groups and regular prayer is something that is very close to my heart, along with helping families to quickly feel connected within the wider church family.

Let us thank our God for the blessing and increase we are experiencing and continue to seek his wisdom and direction in our future work here.

Vicar's Report

This past year has been a period of consolidation and growth. For which I praise God! I have thought for a while that church growth should mirror the oak tree rather than a bramble! Growth may be slow and steady but it should be strong and consistent- not rapid and straggly! I thank God for my colleagues in ministry- both staff and volunteers who share the responsibility of leadership and ministry. This report is God's story in our midst.

Our year began with the most comprehensive spiritual life survey this church has ever conducted. The results of that survey are still being worked out in a variety of ways. Firstly, we found that we are quite a varied church:

With this, and <u>much more</u> information, the church leadership have considered what the needs of the church might be and how they might be met. One area that came up as a 'learning need' was greater understandings of the Christian faith. As such, we have implemented a Theology Café, which is reaching over 110 participants. We have commenced more systematic preaching of the Bible to help us route our faith in scripture. Far from scaring away new church members, it seems to be attractive when presented in an accessible manner.

In the second part of the year, Christ Church served the wider church through facilitating the Willow Creek Leadership Summit. Once again, I was proud of the amazing service that was demonstrated by so many people. That same Autumn, I took on responsibility for Anglican Deanery matters as Area Dean. This was during a great deal of change with 5 of the 11 benefices seeing minister vacancies and a further parish supporting a minister in a period of long-term ill health. As such, a great deal of my time was 'learning the ropes' and supporting my fellow clergy and parish Church Wardens. As we enter the New Year, this process continues. It reminds me how grateful I am of able and willing staff and volunteers who have compensated for me when my time was required elsewhere.

So, what does 2011- 2012 hold for Christ Church?

In a word: Mission! I believe that God is preparing Christ Church to more fully engage in mission. We have engaged in mission through our buildings and the opportunities that they provide. I believe that God is calling us to expand our horizon to engage in our community more actively. This may be through our local schools, our local sports clubs, inside or outside our shops. We need to be listening to the needs of our community and demonstrating that that these are met in Jesus Christ. I believe that we will forge stronger partnerships with like-minded churches to share the gospel in culturally appropriate language.

To fulfil this mission, we will need to commit ourselves to prayer, to sacrificial giving and generous service. I would venture to suggest that in our growth, we can become comfortable. God has blessed us with good finances, fine buildings and able people. It is tempting to enjoy those things in a self-centred way. I don't want us to become a comfortable church- not in that way. I believe that God has blessed us that we might bless others. So, that is our challenge. AS John Dunnett: Director of CPAS said to members of the PCC and Leadership Teams: "Mission should not simply be on the agenda, it is the agenda."
